leads the design and development process that will prepare Intrepid R/T for the track. That means coaxing out around 750 horsepower and refining the aerodynamics


so that the car is stable in drafts at 200 mph.
Evernham is helping to revive Dodge's presence in stock car racing, but Dodge's heritage is older than even the 42-year-old Evernham himself. It was 50 years ago when Dodge first competed in a NASCAR race,

at Canfield, Ohio. The first of 160 triumphs came in 1953, when Lee Petty careened to victory at West Palm Beach,

Florida, in a year when he claimed the series title for Dodge. The likes of Buck Baker, David Pearson, Bobby Isaac and Richard Petty also drove Dodge stock cars to NASCAR Winston Cup Series titles. Dodge chose to leave the series in 1977. But as the popularity of this colorful sport grew during the 1990s, it became evident it was time for Dodge to return. That means competing on 20 different tracks around the country. Among them are fabled venues: Darlington, so narrow that cars brushing the retaining wall are said to wear the "Darlington stripe"; Daytona, so steeply banked that the driver turns left at 200 mph without lifting his right foot; and tiny Bristol, that bowl of thrills, the most steeply banked of all, at 36 degrees in the

Repeat, no fenders. Jeff Simmons repeated as Barber Dodge Pro Series champion in 1999, earning a \$300,000 career enhancement award and wide notice in the open-wheel racing community. The Barber Dodge single-seater is powered by an engine based on the Intrepid's 3.2-liter DOHC V6, but producing 265 horsepower at 6,300 rpm. Which is

another way of saying Dodge compellingly motivates young drivers to develop skills they will take along to other major racing series.

Homework pays off. In
1999, the word "strong"
kept coming up to describe
Ram Pickups competing in the
NASCAR Craftsman Truck Series.
With significantly fewer Dodge entries

nevertheless captured the pole position for nine of

25 races, and there were four race victories. At season's end, three Ram drivers ranked among the top 10 in series points. The consensus was that Dodge had really done its homework when developing Ram Pickup for the track.

Unremedied snakebites. The American Le Mans Series was new in 1999, but Viper GTS-R was up to its old tricks, learned overseas, of winning the GTS class in each of six races. While North American audiences were getting used to seeing

Viper master the serpentine turns of the racetrack, European spectators witnessed a familiar sight: Viper GTS-R captured the first six positions in class at the 24 Hours of Le Mans, and routinely discarded its GTS-class competitors in other FIA-sanctioned endurance races.
